# Mobility

# 1. EU Nationals living and working in the UK



- If already living in the UK before Brexit EU citizens will be able to apply for the **EU settlement scheme**, which if granted will give indefinite leave to remain.
- They and their families can register for EU Settled Status for free until the end of 2020 in no deal, but June 2021 in a deal. This can be done online, or via the app.

- EU, EEA and Swiss citizens and their families who move to the UK after Brexit will be able to continue living, working and studying in the UK until the end of 2020. If they intend to stay beyond that, they should apply for **Temporary Leave to Remain**, which is free.
- **Short-term travel** to the UK will remain largely unchanged until a new immigration system is in place from 2021. EU, EEA and Swiss citizens arriving after will still be able to come to the UK as they do now, and border crossing arrangements will not change.
- **MAC commission** on a future immigration system - the call for evidence is open until 5th November 2019 and we encourage you to respond.

### 3. UK Nationals travel the EU: No Deal



- If you export a service, you may experience changes to business travel that involves crossing an EU border.
- The EU will allow UK citizens to travel to the EU for **90 days in any 180 days** for business meetings, conferences, receiving training, sports and cultural events, and short-term study.
- UK citizens should ensure their passport is less than 10 years old and has at least 6 months validity on the day of travel.
- If you are undertaking activity outside of these areas or intend to stay for more than 90 days in any 180-day period, **you should check whether you will need a visa, work permit or other documentation.**

- No changes on services or mobility during the Implementation Period.
- Political Declaration states that we will look to negotiate visa-free travel for short term visits and temporary entry, and stay, for business purposes.
- We also agreed to consider:
  - conditions for entry and stay for purposes such as research, study, training and youth exchanges; and
  - addressing social security coordination.
